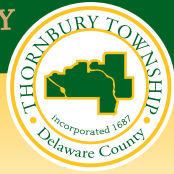

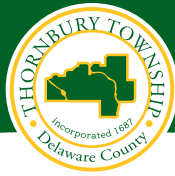

RECENT BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ACTIONS

May 5, 2021

- The contract with Envirep TLC, for the purchase of OmniSite Monitoring Equipment for use at the Township Pump Stations, at a cost not to exceed \$3,918.00, with Cellular/Website/Smartphone App Service to be billed at \$23.00 per month for one year, as detailed in their proposal was approved.

May 19, 2021

- A contribution of \$500.00 to the Western Delaware Valley Lions, for their 2021 Golf Outing to be held in June was approved.
- Awarding the 2021 Road Program Contract #1 to Glasgow, Inc. was approved.

June 2, 2021

- Hiring Summer Camp Staff of Cindy McCord of CMC Productions, Jeremiah Daudert, Lauren Turco and Annie Seagraves was approved.
- Authorizing Jeff Seagraves, the Township Manager, to execute any documents that are required for the application of American Rescue Plan funding was approved.

Our summer had many great events. Most recently, our annual Founder's Day took place on September 11th.

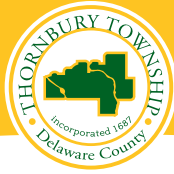
The event was very well attended, and the day marked the 20th anniversary of the attacks on our great nation. We honored those lost on that tragic day, and we will never forget.

Environmental Advisory Council

This fall marks the third Tree for a Ten event since it was announced it in 2020. By the time you are reading this, the EAC will have subsidized the purchase of approximately 600 trees to township residents. Can one person help global warming by planting a tree? Yes. However, when a decision to plant a tree is made by 200 or so individual residents, that impact is magnified exponentially. According to the Arbor Day Foundation, in one year a mature tree will absorb more than 48 pounds of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and release oxygen in exchange and in addition provide habitat for birds, animals and help mitigate stormwater runoff. In order to support the health of the entire tree canopy, diversity is needed in trees, which is why the EAC has carefully selected a diverse selection that will thrive in our environment.

The Locksley Road entrance and parking lot to the Luckenbach trail has been well used this past year. This spring the EAC cleared the parking lot and brush around the trail head at the Cheyney Road section of the trail to provide additional trail parking. A sign is in the process of being made to indicate this new parking area.

Emerald Ash Borer in Delaware County is well established, and many Ash trees have already died. This is a good time of year to identify trees on your property that may be hazards and prioritize removal. Heavily infested trees exhibit canopy dieback usually starting at the top of the tree. Most of the canopy will be dead within 2 years of when symptoms are first observed. Find more information on the Penn State Extension website or www.treephilly.org. Take inventory now, as the longer you wait to remove a diseased tree the more it will cost. *T*

Applicants submit their report for review by a team of financial professionals who provide feedback to improve future documents. If the report meets the requirements of the program, it may receive the Certificate of Excellence. A district's participation in the COE program can facilitate bond rating and continuing bond disclosure processes.

- The agreement with SBA Towers, LLC, to Sub-Lease space on the tower located at 5 Township Drive, to Dish Wireless, in accordance with their proposal dated August 23, 2021 was approved.

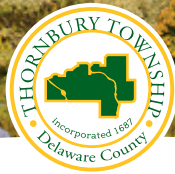

Historical Commission Letter

A Little Bit of This...and A Little Bit of That
Historical vs. Historic: Historic means "having importance in history." Historical means "from the past."

Bit One: The Brandywine Task Force Historic Roadside Marker "An Exhausted Retreat" mentioned in our Fall 2020 Newsletter article was installed on Thornton Road across from the Stables restaurant. The familiar blue marker is placed to be easily read from the parking lot. Thank you, Art and Howard, for installing and thank you, Bill and Sophia Clinger, for offering that location.

Bit Two: The Historic Resource Property (HRP) Studies Project currently has 25 reports online. Three more will arrive on line shortly with a forth anticipated by years end. This totals 29 property owners with extensive knowledge of their property's and resource's past. We will be contacting HRP owners soon to set up research for the five properties for 2022. Thank you to the Board of Supervisors for allowing us to move forward with this project. Special thanks to Sue Howat, as she is the one who has to navigate placing this material online.

Bit Three: "The Storytellers." This is a continuation of and enhancement to our Oral History Project and our Historical Resource Property Studies Project. For many years our Historical Commission

and our Historical Society have been presented with the writings many caring individuals took the time to convey about their (and your), everyday Thornbury. Rather than keep the knowledge hidden away in our files we are sharing it online. Several stories are available now with more arriving from time to time. If all goes according to plan, we will wind up with a rather extensive library of articles.

Bit Four: Expanding on "Bit Two"... In May of this year the Heritage Commission of Delaware County presented a Certificate of Appreciation for our Historic Resource Property Studies Project. The award was presented to the Historical Commission, the Historical Society, the Board of Supervisors and Mary Sue Boyle & Co., LLC. This recognized our Outstanding Contributions to Historic Preservation in Delaware County, in the category of Preservation Planning. The Heritage Commission noted our project is a good model for other historical organizations to emulate.

Last Bit: All the above are examples of how, with our Supervisors' and Township staff support, our Historical Society and Historical Commission volunteers and professional researchers, Thornbury, again, stands out as the special place it is. *TF*

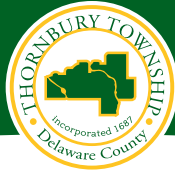
Arasapha Farm has reopened with new activities like a picnic area and sunflower field and old favorites like the corn maze and hay rides.

RACHEL KOHL LIBRARY

72 Sweetwater Road:

*Conditional Use –

At the March meeting the PC discussed the applicant's proposal to preserve, restore, upgrade, and re-use the property for additional bed and breakfast rooms as part of Grace Winery. The members recommended approval of the adaptive re-use of this historical structure and the use of the barn for special events associated with the bed and breakfast.

1661 Old Gradyville Road:

Minor Subdivision

At the April meeting the applicant proposed a minor lot-line change between Thornbury and Edgmont

Townships with no property changes or development within Thornbury Township. The members recommended approval of this lot line change.

15 Tanguy Road (a.k.a. O'Kane):

*Land Development –
Preliminary/Final Plan*

Last July, the applicant proposed tearing down the existing house and constructing a new house, driveway, and pole barn. During the November and December meetings, the discussion continued regarding tree replacement requirements, pole barn size and accessibility, setbacks, and stormwater. Revised plans have been received and were discussed at the October meeting. Discussion will continue upon receipt of revised plans. *TT*

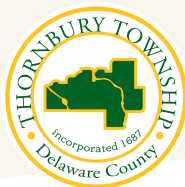
