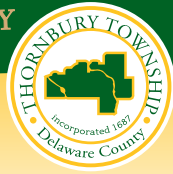

Life Begins at Retirement Congratulations to Bob Haines!

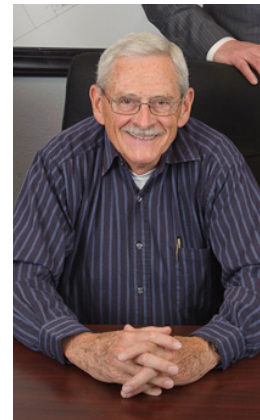

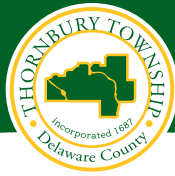

Almost a year after COVID-19 put the kibosh on life as we know it, including trail work, the EAC came out strong on March 6, 2021 to clear an area at Barrett's Meadow for the installation of a new brown bat maternity house! The brown bat population is threatened; its population down by 80% in Pennsylvania. Given that Barrett's Meadow is a wetland, the brown bats will not go hungry and hikers will be pleased to know that brown bats eat millions of insects, including mosquitos! Brown bats are also, surprisingly, great pollinators and seed spreaders.

The sizeable maternity bat house is being built by township volunteer, Mark Beard, who also built and installed the various Bluebird houses dotting the parks' borders and the large Purple Martin house close to the entrance. Having new homes and conducive habitat has made Barrett's Meadow an attraction for local bird groups and has "put Thornbury on the map," so to speak! In the meadow you may also spot Red Winged Black Birds, our Blue Heron and Red-Tailed Hawks.

If you are looking for a way to get involved in the township that involves immersion in the great outdoors, please consider joining the EAC for future projects, ideas or outdoor education our join our monthly meetings. Events are posted on our Facebook page. Lastly, thank you to all the residents who inquired about the beehives. Hopefully we'll have a well-pollinated Township in the coming years! *TT*

Brighter Days Through Gardening... The Three Sisters

The "Three Sisters" is an ancient companion planting practice from the indigenous populations of the Americas and has been around for perhaps 5,000 years. This practice of planting corn, pole beans and winter squash is widely recognized as an extremely sustainable and environmentally friendly farming technique. While found in many other areas and tribes of North American, the technique is attributed to the Northeastern Woodland tribes, especially the Iroquois Confederacy. The name comes from an Iroquois legend. According to the legend, corn, beans and squash were inseparable sisters that were given to the people by the "Great Spirit."

These crops complement one another. Beans (B) are fantastic for soil health because they host microorganisms in their roots that take nitrogen from the air and transfer it to the soil making it available for use by plants. Corn (C) has large upright stalks, which act as a pole-like structure that the climbing beans can wrap around. The large leaves of the winter squash (SQ) shade the soil, depriving weeds from sunlight while preventing moisture from escaping due to evaporation. The squash stems and leaves are also spiny, discouraging animal pests from infiltrating. If a fourth sister (SF) was included, it was a plant that attracted pollinators (e.g. Rocky Mountain bee plant attracted bees).

Furthermore, the main "three sisters" each provide an important component of a healthy diet: corn provides carbohydrates; beans supply protein; and squash are rich in vitamins. Finally, since each of the "Three Sisters" is from a different crop family, they are susceptible to different diseases and pests making them much more resilient.

This companion planting technique, still in use today, maintains high yields, promotes healthy soil, suppresses weeds, attracts pollinators, promotes genetic diversity, and requires low water input—all without harmful chemical pesticides and fertilizers. If you have a limited space to plant, the image shown with this article shows a four-foot circle which can contain 47 plants. *T*

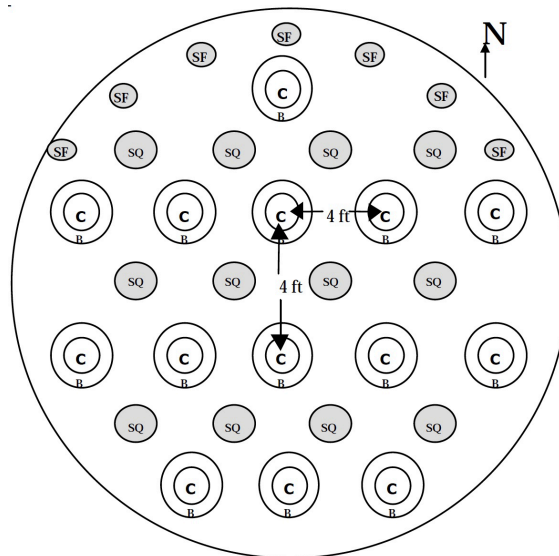


Figure 1: Circular Wampanoag Garden

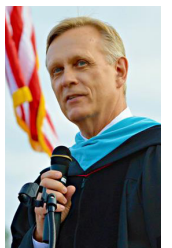

Requests

If you have a specific title in mind, we encourage you to search our online catalog, Encore, for its availability and request it yourself. You may also call us at 610-358-3445 ext. 2. If you have the capability, we ask that you please consider requesting via Encore so as to keep our phone

lines free for others arriving to pickup their orders. While our Google form was a temporary solution when we were without van service, you may still use the form if you don't have a specific title in mind and would like the library to select books for you. You can, for example, ask us to select four children's dinosaur books or two adult mysteries. Otherwise, we ask that you revert back to the pre-quarantine ordering of books through Encore. All materials will be loaned out for three weeks and allowed one renewal. Additionally, if you have any unfulfilled holds placed prior to quarantine that you no longer need, kindly log on to your account and cancel them.

If you would like to check out materials or access our e-resources and don't have a library card, please email support@delcolibraries.org with your name, address, phone number, and birth date. You will receive an email with a library card number and receive a physical card in the mail.

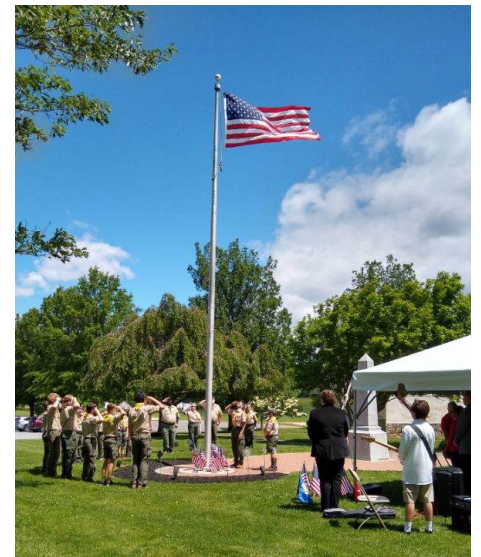
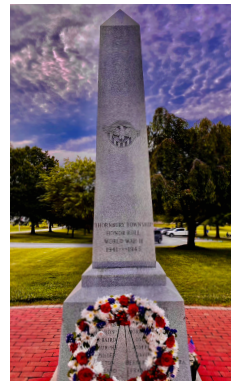
No appointment is needed; just come anytime during the pickup hours. Phone orders will be ready for pickup approximately one hour after being placed. Orders will be held for five days. Orders placed an hour or less before closing may not be ready for pick up until the next operating day. When you arrive, park and call the library's front desk at 610-358-3445 ext. 2. If you are without a cellphone, call and inform us of your expected arrival time before leaving to pick up your order.

Returns

The library's outside return bins are open 24/7. Please do not give returns to staff during curbside pickup. For both patron and staff safety, all returns will be quarantined for four days before being checked in (so don't be surprised if an item you returned is still on your account). Returns will be backdated after the four day quarantine. You may also renew online. *T*

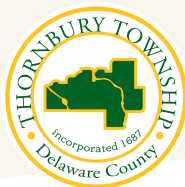
