MARK KELLY VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR AWARD





Township Manager Letter

Hello fellow residents. I've had the honor of serving as your Township Manager since January 2005. I can tell you that I have never been more proud of our Township than throughout the catastrophic weather event that occurred on October 31, 2019. It seems that during drastic times, we often find out the true character of neighbors and our community. I would like to personally thank the emergency responders from our local fire departments, EMT services as well as the Delaware County Emergency Services.

I received a call alerting me about the destruction in the Cobblestones development at 12:18am on November 1, 2019. Upon arrival approximately 15 minutes later, I saw the most impressive response efforts that I have ever witnessed. The incident command post was established and requested a shelter for residents that were displaced from their damaged homes. Our good neighbors from The Glen Mills Schools provided their cafeteria immediately upon request. The shelter was staffed by township personnel along with members of The Red Cross and the Delaware County Emergency Management Services.

The actions of those involved were a testament to the commitment that each individual and group has made to our community. In the past, we have asked you to consider joining our volunteer fire companies or to complete CERT training (see box to the right).

In light of recent events, I suggest each of you further consider how you can serve. Our volunteer fire companies desperately need your help. This is the group that responded to the 911 calls our residents placed immediately following the EF-2 tornado. We strongly urge to you to consider becoming part a volunteer group to help guarantee there will be a response to future 911 calls. Please contact the Township with your interests and we will steer you in the right direction. Thank you for your consideration and have a safe holiday season. \mathcal{T}

Emergency Preparedness training and volunteer opportunities exist with the Delaware County Department of Emergency Services through Citizen Corps. The Delaware County Citizen Corps is an umbrella organization for disaster volunteers and organizations interested in emergency preparedness, response and recovery in Delaware County.

Interested citizens may affiliate directly with the county's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), Medical Reserve Corps (MRC), and the County Animal Response Team (CART). Faith based and community groups, non-profit organizations, and businesses may join the Citizen Corps as a member organization.

The purpose of this Corps is to provide and support emergency and disaster operations during mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery phases. The cumulative effect of volunteers and member organizations is a community prepared to respond to and recover from any and all hazards that may present themselves in the county.

Volunteers are provided regular training, participate in drills and exercises, and are used for public health emergencies, and sheltering during and after disasters.

September 4, 2019

- Approved the minor two lot residential subdivision application of Christopher Mace for the property at 28 Gradyville Road.

foundation of our structures. Our homes would not be a valuable without the lush surroundings that embrace them. That 10-degree drop in heat you feel upon returning to the inside of forested Thornbury during the hottest summer months is worth as much to the quality of life as the old mills and the memory of Squire Cheyney. There are some things that are out of our control, such as the Emerald ash borer and other pests that threaten the guardians of our soil and shade. But the things we can control are worth our time, concern and, yes, expense. WINTERIZE YOUR SEPTIC SYSTEM

Take time to look at your system so that you can avoid serious damage and costly repairs over the winter.

- Don't use anti-freeze. It is a common misconception that it is needed. It is actually not recommended. Antifreeze can throw off the balance of the necessary bacteria.
- The cover of septic tanks are often overlooked. Make sure that it is not loose, coming off or damaged.
- Do not run anything over the drain field for your septic tank. You could run the risk of damaging pipes or compacting the soil and limiting the effectiveness of the septic tank.



Turkey and Citrus Salad

- 8 oz. sugar snap peas
- 2 cups leftover cubed turkey
- 4 cups baby spinach
- 4 cups mixed salad greens
- 2 cups sliced mushrooms
- 115 oz. can mandarin oranges, drained
- ½ cup walnut halves
- ½ cup raspberry vinaigrette

Thornbury Township is fortunate in that we are covered by three Fire Companies; Concordville, Chester Heights and Edgmont. Sam Iannucci, Jr. Chief Fire Officer from Chester Heights Volunteer Fire Co. No. 1 came to the Township building to teach the staff about fire safety and specifically how to operate a fire extinguisher. Sam was a patient and thorough teacher and gave us a hands-on demonstration. We learned that here at the office, and at home we need a Fire Emergency Plan which includes what door you will use to exit the building in the event of a fire (plan two ways out of the building) and where you will meet once you get out of the building. It's necessary to discuss and practice getting out of the building because it takes 30 seconds or less for a small flame to become a large fire.

The Township staff learned about the different types of fire and also the different types of fire extinguishers. (see chart). Fire type A: trash, wood, paper. Fire type B: Liquids such as gas and Fire type C: Electrical equipment. Fire Extinguishers should be kept on each floor of your home (or office) as well as the garage. They are surprisingly easy to operate, using the abbreviation PAAS; Pull

the pin, Aim, Squeeze and Sweep. Smoke alarms should also be installed on each floor as well as each bedroom of a home and their batteries should be changed annually. They can actually save lives.

These fire companies are all run by volunteers and are always in need. Please

consider volunteering. If you don't think that you are cut out of emergency training, there are many other ways to contribute. See the article on page 2 about all the ways you can volunteer and get involved for the benefit of your community. **T**

PLANNING COMMISSION UPDATES

Residents are invited to attend meetings held on the 2nd Wednesday of the month at 7pm.

Subdivision and Land Development: 87 Tanguy Rd., (a.k.a. Eric C. Hansen) Minor Resubdivision Plan: The site for this 2-lot, 5.97 acre subdivision is located at County Lane and Tanguy Rd. The property contains a 3-story dwelling, a garage/barn, pool, pool house, and a tennis court. At the October meeting revised plans were discussed. Parcel A will now be subdivided off of the parent tract and merged with land owned by applicant in Chester County. There are no proposed improvements other than removing the driveway which links existing dwelling at 87 Tanguy Rd. to lot 2 which is the property in Chester County. A new driveway connection will be made. The members recommended this plan for approval conditioned upon the satisfactory compliance with Catania Engineering Associates, Inc. letter of October 7, 2019 and deed restriction language for Parcel A that is reviewed and approved by the Township Land Planner and Township Planning Commission Solicitor as noted in comment #32 of the referenced review letter.

Discussions are ongoing for several interpretive panels for the Summer Kitchen and Springhouse buildings on the grounds where the Farmer's Market is staged. All our methods are designed to educate and inspire a further desire of our residents to remember and help preserve. This is a team effort. Tr
